## Farmers Take Center Stage in Albany

Lewis County Farm Bureau members joined farmers from across the state in Albany to advocate on behalf of agriculture during New York Farm Bureau's Lobby Day. They kicked off the two-day trip with the Taste of New York reception, a popular event attended by elected officials that highlights the diversity of agriculture. Lewis County joined forces with Cornell Cooperative Extension to provide information and samples of Mercer's Dairy Wine Ice Cream made in Boonville. Members spent a full day attending meetings with Senators and Members of the Assembly, with not only their own elected officials, but also with New York City legislators.

"Meeting with our 'adopted' legislators whose districts tend to be vastly different from rural New York have been of great value. It gives them a better understanding of what we do and why we do it, and they

are likely to remember our interactions when voting on legislation pertaining to agriculture," said Joe Shultz, Lewis County Farm Bureau Vice President. They gave each lawmaker an honest assessment of the additional economic pressures family farms have been facing over the past two years, including low commodity and milk prices and rising labor costs. They discussed the need for critical funding and legislation to help protect and strengthen agriculture including offsetting the harmful effects of the minimum wage increase.
