LEGISLATIVE SUCCESS

In December, NYFB celebrated the House passage of the Whole Milk for Healthy Kids Act, earlier passed by the Senate. This legislation allows schools the choice to serve whole, 2%, 1% and skim flavored or plain milk as part of school meals, overturning the 2012 rules that allowed only fat-free or 1% milk to be served in schools.

Empowering Innovation

For over a century, New York Farm Bureau has served as the state's premier advocate for the agricultural community. At its heart, NYFB is a grassroots organization; members directly shape our legislative priorities by proposing and voting on key policy positions. Beyond advocacy, we empower our members through exclusive networking, leadership development, and educational tools designed to drive the success of farms and agribusinesses alike. NYFB remains a steadfast force, ensuring a prosperous future for New York agriculture.



NATIONAL AWARD OF EXCELLENCE

NYFB was the winner of an American Farm Bureau Federation New Horizon Award — one of just six states to receive the honor, which recognizes new and innovative initiatives at the state level. Our winning submission outlined the tremendous growth and success of our State Annual Convention, which now attracts nearly 500 participants.

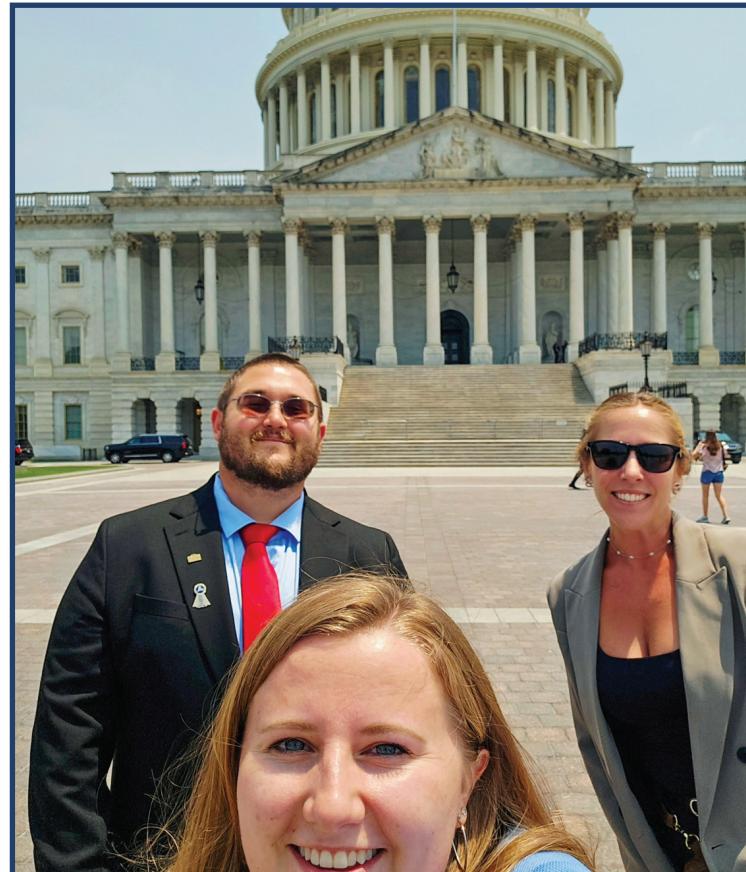

Public Policy in Action

New York Farm Bureau's public policy team, aided by the hire of policy analysts Gabriella Taylor and Benjamin Pallack, had a busy year. We continuously met with legislators and staff, coordinated lobby days and spoke at several press conferences. Our Taste of NY reception was highly attended, including a visit from Governor Hochul, and our members continued advocacy efforts by meeting with legislators during NYFB Lobby Day.

The state legislative session ended with multiple successes for New York agriculture. The final state budget extended the farm workforce retention tax credit to 2029 and added \$5 million to the farmworker housing revolving loan fund. Additionally, we successfully advocated for the fix to the farm employer overtime tax credit and made it retroactive for 2024 and 2025. We also successfully advocated to pay off the state unemployment insurance debt and fund universal school meals. Overall, we helped secure important state funding for agricultural research, commodity promotion, farmland protection, farm safety programs and more. And, we were able to stop the Extended Producer Responsibility Act and the TEMP Act.

We organized and attended summer and fall farm tours, including our Legislative Farm Tour in Rensselaer and Washington counties. More than 50 people attended, including state legislators, government officials and other staff.

On the federal level, we met with New York Congressional delegation members to advocate for sound regulatory reforms, and we invited NYFB members to several Washington, D.C. lobby events. Young Farmers & Ranchers participated in American Farm Bureau Federation's Fly-In in June, where they discussed the Farm Bill, trade and the reconciliation bill, later signed into law on July 4.

NYFB worked diligently to ensure that members received updates on federal issues, such as Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI), and hosted several webinars with other industry leaders. When there were federal cuts/funding freezes and when the regulatory tariffs were enacted, we gathered information from our members on how these actions impacted their farm businesses and relayed that information to the federal government.

We worked closely with AFBF to secure \$65.5 billion in farm program funding over the next 10 years in the One Big Beautiful Bill reconciliation bill (H.R. 1), and we supported many business provisions within the previous Tax Cuts and Jobs Act that were extended in H.R. 1. We continued to lobby for agricultural immigration reform that recognizes the unique needs of farms in the Northeast, especially H-2A program reform.

Our public policy team submitted regulatory comments on various proposed agency rules, including the OSHA Heat Injury & Illness Prevention Plan; the USDA Reorganization Plan; and the rescission of provisions within the Farmworker Protection Rule.

We also signed onto various letters sent to Congress on myriad topics and authored a letter supporting critical Cornell funding.

We thank our members for sharing policy ideas and participating in grassroots advocacy. Your work helps NYFB remain the voice of agriculture.

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Member Engagement

We are excited about "Generations Strong" membership campaign, which is an integral part of our operational philosophy. The campaign goals are to prioritize member value, maintain high retention and provide effective tools to help attract new members.

We have significantly expanded our member savings and business solutions offerings. At the state level, our numerous partnerships with statewide organizations continue to successfully put dollars back in our members' pockets. Over the last 12 months we have added discounts with Office Depot, KEY Apparel, Dungarees, FieldClock and StoneX. These valuable programs have been consistently promoted in Grassroots and in our weekly e-news alerts, ensuring high member awareness and utilization.

The foundational shift we made in 2024 to an anniversary membership cycle has proven to be a major success in strengthening our retention efforts. We have generated a sustained excitement around membership, which has us on a clear path to future growth success. We are committed to making 2026 a milestone year for membership growth and engagement.

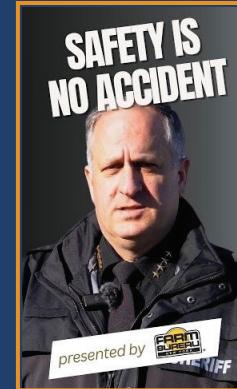

Over the course of the past year, the NYFB Communications Department has seen significant growth. We have increased our social media engagement, thanks to careful partnerships and compelling, relevant content. We focus our work on not only promoting the mission of New York Farm Bureau, but also on growing membership in new and interesting ways. For example, we appeal to younger audiences by posting short videos more frequently, and we continue to represent a variety of commodities through our podcasts and our longer-form videos.

Because we want to be sure we are communicating with our members in the most efficient ways possible, we devised a survey that was sent to the entire membership. Perhaps unsurprisingly, about 67% of respondents said they preferred digital communications from NYFB, while about 26% said they preferred print. Nearly 60% reported that they read every issue of the bimonthly *Grassroots* newspaper, and some members expressed strong opinions

about their preference of either the print or digital version.

Our media coverage continues to grow, with 1,249 press mentions throughout the year. We conducted several media interviews with print, radio and TV outlets, including major outlets such as the New York Times and CBS. And, our social media presence is gaining strength, with strong engagement in campaigns like "Share the Road" and in organic content.

We created sponsored content for the popular "Empire Report," an Albany publication for legislators, and we penned op-eds on behalf of NYFB Board President David Fisher.

In the year ahead, we plan to use the data from the survey to streamline our communications by writing shorter articles and using more photos in *Grassroots*; condensing weekly alerts; and targeting news information to specific commodities.

We will keep members apprised as we continue to evolve with the changing demands of communications.

Safety Group 486

NYFB Safety Group 486 has served NYFB members' business needs for workers' compensation since 1967. The second largest safety group in New York State, Safety Group 486 offers coverage for 23 agricultural class codes, covering many ag-related businesses.

This year, our Safety Group 486 team, under the direction of Michele Bates, expanded with the hire of Mark Crawford as Associate Director of Workers' Compensation Insurance Services and Clayton Bastiani as Customer Service Representative.

Benefits include a 25% upfront discount, free risk-control services through NYSIF, licensed professional staff to assist with all aspects of your policy, and an annual dividend averaging 42% over five years. The 2024 dividend returned over \$7.6 million to 2,077 policyholders.

We also provide Disability and Paid Family Leave coverage and Other States Coverage (OSC) through NYSIF with a New York workers' compensation policy.

Continued decreases in workers' compensation rates alone make Safety Group 486 a competitive and cost-effective option for your business. The additional 25% upfront discount and 42% average dividend can result in significant savings.

Young Farmers & Ranchers



In July, a YF&R group gathered in Geneva for a day of learning, connection and great food. From farm tours to conversations about business and history, these experiences help young farmers grow their skills and strengthen our agricultural community.

The New York Farm Bureau Young Farmers & Ranchers (YF&R) program continues working to offer programming to our state's young farmers and agricultural professionals. Our state committee meets virtually on a monthly basis to discuss program planning.

This year's annual in-person committee meeting was held at StaCon, where committee members participated in the Myers-Briggs Type Indicator (MBTI), a psychological assessment that identifies an individual's personality type. The MBTI aims to help people understand their natural preferences and those of others for better communication and relationships.

The state committee continues to work in conjunction with the Harvest for All program through American Farm Bureau Federation by volunteering their time to regional food banks and collecting donated goods. During our 2025 annual leadership conference the committee, along with conference attendees, packed over 500 snack bags containing items donated by the YF&R program for the Boys and Girls Club of East Syracuse weekend backpack program.

The group partnered this year with Nationwide Insurance to offer informational webinars on topics like agritourism and agricultural crime

prevention. Our summer programming included a policy picnic and farm tours in the Finger Lakes Region.

Several of our NYFB young farmers, including our 2025 Collegiate Discussion Meet contestant from Cornell University, attended and AFBF Fusion conference in Denver, CO. Young farmers from across the state participated in monthly AFBF YF&R connect calls to learn more about programs for young farmers and different commodities, and to network with other young farmers from across the country.

NYFB is happy to announce a new collegiate chapter at Alfred State College. The YF&R Committee works with four active collegiate chapters: Cornell, SUNY Cobleskill, Alfred, and SUNY Morrisville. The chapters conduct regularly scheduled meetings, participate in campus events, and provide other activities for students, including farm tours and attendance at NYFB events. The NYFB YF&R programs continue to support the youth involved in New York State FFA and 4-H chapters. This spring our NYFB YF&R chair had the honor to speak at the New York State FFA 100th Annual Convention during the prestigious Empire Degree Luncheon, sponsored by the NYFB YF&R program.

Promotion & Engagement

We thank Bill Zalakar, who transitioned to Executive Director of Long Island Farm Bureau, and Renée St. Jacques, who was promoted to director of NYFB's Public Policy Department, for their service and dedication.

Throughout 2025, P&E members were actively engaged across the state, supporting signature programs and events including Ag Literacy Week, NYFB scholarships, Ask a Farmer, FUSION, and the committee's StaCon fundraiser, the "Sow You Think You Know" trivia game.

Food & Farm Experience

NYFB's Legal Resources

NYFB's Legal Service and Referral Plan continues to assist members who may be in need of legal counsel. This includes members who have legal questions or concerns and are looking for attorneys who specialize in the area of law that matches their needs. This past year the free referral program provided information to 23 NYFB members who called the state office. As part of the program, participating attorneys offer Farm Bureau members a 15% discount off their fees. We were pleased to add two more law firms to our service in 2025.

NYFB continues to grow the Legal Defense Fund to be ready to protect farmers' rights in the legal arena. The fund is utilized in cases that involve a Farm Bureau policy issue and stand to have a far-reaching effect on agriculture and impact farmers throughout the state.

In response to an increase in raids and other ICE activity, in 2025 we worked with outside counsel to update NYFB's immigration guide, now the Farmer's Guide to Immigration Worksite Enforcement: An Employer's Rights and Responsibilities. This new version provides an overview of federal laws and regulations related to ICE and immigration laws, various definitions, and an explanation of the general authority of ICE officers and their authority to conduct searches, including permissible conduct by an ICE/CBP officer and what to do after an ICE raid.

We continue to offer the Farmer's Guide to Truck and Implement Laws and Regulations, a comprehensive guide which provides an overview of the myriad of New York State and federal laws and regulations related to farm vehicles and implements. Topics include licensing, registration of both farm plate and agricultural vehicles, general vehicle regulations, farm implements and equipment, alcohol and drug testing requirements, and more.



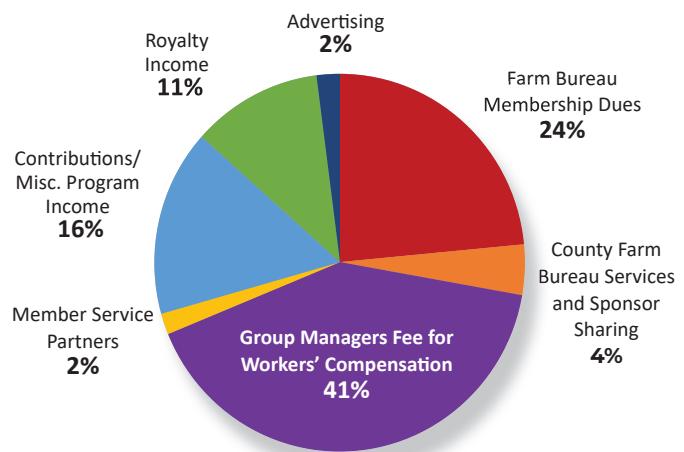
LINC/EIC Conference in Geneva

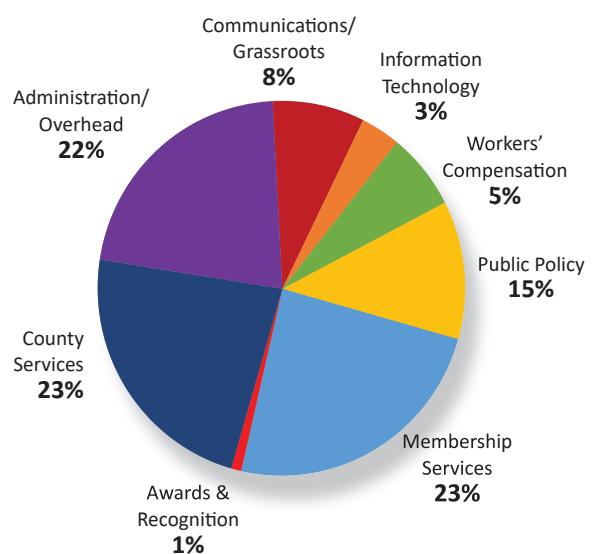
Revenue based on FY 2025

State Annual Convention

A Growing Legacy of Leadership and Engagement

New York Farm Bureau's State Annual Convention (StaCon) has evolved into a flagship event that educates, engages and empowers members while strengthening the organization's grassroots foundation. Once focused primarily on conducting official Farm Bureau business, StaCon has been transformed through strategic planning, member feedback and a commitment to innovation into a dynamic professional development and networking experience that helps cultivate future leaders.

The creation of a Director of Events and Development role brought professional structure, year-round strategy and a clear vision for growth. New elements, including a formal workshop Request for Proposals process,

dynamic keynote sessions and the launch of the Mini-Grant Challenge, have strengthened engagement and delivered practical, member-driven outcomes that support farms and communities.

Growth in both sponsorship support and attendance over the past two years reflects how strategic vision and collaboration have successfully revitalized StaCon and reinvigorated this long-standing tradition.

In recognition of this transformation, New York Farm Bureau was named the winner of the American Farm Bureau Federation's New Horizon Award, a national honor celebrating innovative state programs that drive member engagement and organizational growth.
