Lewis County Farm Bureau Attends State Annual Meeting

Lewis County Farm Bureau joined farmer members from across the state at New York Farm Bureau's State Annual Meeting on Dec. 5-6 in Albany to set the public policy priorities for the coming year. Delegates from the county Farm Bureau were also recognized for their achievements on behalf of the more than 200 farm families they represent.

"It is a truly energizing experience to be in a room with a diverse group of farmers, working together to advance our industry through this unique grassroots process", said Lewis County Farm Bureau President Jen Karelus. "We are looking ahead to another tough year; the policy agenda we set will go a long way in keeping our farms innovative and viable."

Five Silver Key awards were presented to the county Farm Bureau for exhibiting excellence in the following categories: Membership Agricultural Education & Promotion; County Financial Management; Information and Public Relations; Leadership Development and Policy Implementation—State and National. The county Farm Bureau was awarded a \$600 check from New York Farm Bureau for its efforts.



Through Nov. 2017, <u>nine million pounds</u> of fresh food and farm products have been donated by farmers to regional food banks. That translates into nearly seven million meals being provided to New Yorkers in need.

"New York farmers come through year after year with generous donations of fresh food to help feed people in their communities who may be struggling. This effort remains a priority for New York Farm Bureau", said David Fisher, New York Farm Bureau President.

Willits Shined on National Stage

Ashley Willits believes that it is important to live with passion, love for others and a desire to be secretly incredible.



Ashley Willits, Class of 2014 from Lowville Academy and Central School, has had a unique opportunity to serve 650,000 members of the National FFA Organization. As most of her classmates have continued with their higher education opportunities or entered the working world, Willits saw an opportunity to make a difference in the organization that has taught her about passion, dedication and leadership.

In October 2016, Willits was elected at the National FFA Convention in Indianapolis, Indiana, as the Eastern Region Vice President. There are only six national officers that travel over 100,000 miles and visit over 25 states in a year of service to the members of FFA and the agriculture industry. Willits is among

a few select people that have held the title of National FFA Officer. She is the 13th New Yorker to be selected to serve in this role and the first female from New York and the first northern New Yorker to be selected to serve.

After high school Willits received her Associates Degree in agricultural business from SUNY Morrisville and started toward her Bachelors Degree in agricultural education at Tarleton State in Stephenville, TX in the fall of 2016. As a national FFA officer she had to put her education on hold for a full year to travel for the national organization and will be returning to Tarleton in the spring of 2018 to complete her degree.

- Increase school meal reimbursements to incentivize the purchase of fresh and minimally processed local food.
- Support the removal of an acreage requirement for farms in the agricultural assessment program as long as they meet income eligibility requirements.


