PROGRAM SPOTLIGHT TOOLS OF THE TRADE

We need you to help promote the "Tools of the Trade" Matching Grant Scholarship Program!

The Tools of the Trade matching funds grant is a financial incentive program which assists successful applicants with opportunities relating to skill and leadership development for Yates County Community members ages 15 - 35 years old. This signature program helps young people to defray the costs associated with attending events, obtaining certifications and licenses, purchasing tools, safety equipment, and clothing, as well as costs associated with attending leadership development activities such as conventions and seminars.

Successful applicants who are members of Yates County Farm Bureau are eligible to receive a maximum amount up to \$650 per calendar year. Successful applicants who are not members of the Yates County Farm Bureau are eligible to receive a maximum amount up to \$500 per calendar year.



One of the highlights of our 2025 agenda is the introduction of the delightful children's book, *The Pie That Molly Grew*, written by Sue Heavenrich and illustrated by Chmisa Kellogg. This engaging story follows Molly as she grows a pumpkin from a single seed. Make plans now to attend the inaugural Farm Bureau Invitational "Picnic in the Pasture" being sponsored by the Yates and Schuyler County Farm Bureau organizations. This very unique opportunity will take place on Tuesday evening, May 20 from 6 - 8 p.m.

The evening will feature an "up close and personalized" tour of **Angus Glen Farms.** All Farm Bureau members are encouraged to attend and consider inviting a prospective Farm Bureau member to this gathering.

Brett Chedzoy is a regional extension forester with Cornell University. Brett and his family operate Angus Glen Farms in Watkins Glen, where they maintain a large cow-calf grass-fed herd on 500 acres of intensively grazed pasture and silvopasture. Brett's approach to building soil health through nutrient dispersion, and his focus on raising cattle in wooded areas rather than barns, is unique and thought-provoking. Brett is a true rotational grazing specialist, and he has created a very dynamic and sustainable approach to raising beef cattle in the Northeast. Participants will have the opportunity for a guided walk (approx. 1 mile) through this agricultural ecosystem. A list of potential topics include:

- History and overview of the farm: what we do and why we do it
- Silvopasturing and the value of adding shade to our pastures



- Optional additional topics as time and interests allow: handling facilities, examples of bale grazing from this winter, our hay equipment with a discussion on making vs. buying hay.
- Updates from the Heritage Tree Seed Project -Sara Tyler, General Manager, Black Squirrel Farms

Brett is also a member of the Farm Bureau organization, and is graciously donating beef burger for our dinner! Farm Bureau members are asked to bring a picnic-style dish to pass.

2024 YATES COUNTY TREE SEED COLLABORATION A HUGE SUCCESS!

As many of you know, The Yates County Farm Bureau has formed an innovative partnership with Sara Tyler, General Manager of Black Squirrel Farms. Our partnership began with Sara Tyler asking for advocacy assistance from YCFB, and together, we were successful in passing a resolution of support for specialty crop producers such as Black Squirrel Farms.

By working together, we are spearheading an innovative project called the Heritage Nut Tree program. The goal was to find the oldest, healthiest nut trees in the Yates County area to serve as future seed trees. Sara Tyler has provided an update on the project below.

YCFB is proud to be involved and wishes to thank all of our members who took time to share the information about the trees on your farm. Thank you!

YATES COUNTY HERITAGE NUT TREE PROJECT: AN UPDATE FROM SARA TYLER

We are pleased to share that initial project results confirm that Yates County farms indeed host a rich collection of old, healthy nut trees, some of which are more than 200 years old, meaning that these trees are older than Yates County itself! A total op 32 nut trees that belong to 20 tree owners, including 16 area farm families, were assessed in 2024. More than 1,300 pounds of raw seed from various species were collected (427 pounds after hulling and high-grading), and while much of this seed was used for testing, some was successfully routed to market and will grow to become 2025 trees. A partnership for summer 2025 butternut tree genetic testing was established with a Purdue University lab, and the National Collection of Genetic Resources for Pecans in Texas was excited to include nuts from a Yates County shagbark hickory, pignut hickory, and shellbark hickory in their perpetual collection. This forever perserves a small piece of Yates County's biological heritage.

The project will continue through summer 2025 with future work building on 2024 highlights, like the identification of a productive 200-year-old shellbark hickory. Yates County was not generally known to host this uncommon tree with shaggy bark that looks very similar to the more familiar shagbark hickory. Shellbark hickories produce the largest of all hickory nuts and their leaves tend to have 7 or 9 leaflets

or 9 leaflets while shagbark hickories mostly have 5 leaflets (occasionally 7). Where there is one shellbark hickory, there may be more and all are likely desirable seed trees. In 2025, we hope to find more shellbark hickories because this wild tree species has the potential to be a food tree of value to the next generation. For completely different reasons, butternut will be a 2025 priority tree. Butternut is under existential threat from butternut canker, and PA/ NY/Massachusetts



is where this species is making its last stand. With conservation success likely being the sole objective of any future regional butternut tree plantings, genetic testing of parent trees combined with a pre-defined planting strategy is necessary to assess seed desirability. Therefore, 2025 project work with butternuts will focus on finding more trees, including wild hybrids, and collecting leaves for genetic testing.

This initiative is based upon work supported by the National Institute of Food and Agriculture, U.S. Department of Agriculture, through the Northeast Sustainable Agriculture Research and Education program (NE SARE) under subaward number ONE24-463. A more detailed project update plus the chance to get your butternut, shellbark hickory and/or favorite Juglandaceae family hybrid nut tree on the project's 2025 list will be included in the May 20th "Picnic in the Pasture" event.
