• Successfully opposed the Extended Producer Responsibility bill for recycling.

The District has been focusing a lot of efforts on nutrient management by working with local farms on waste storage, methane reducing cover and flare systems, manure transfer, and barnyard management projects. The District also offers a wide variety of technical assistance for all types of farms through the Agricultural Environmental Management (AEM) Program. We are currently working with many farms with grazing management, fencing, cover crops, water management, and soil erosion projects.

The District is working on enhanced nutrient management planning with several CAFO farms in the County for a final round of funding opportunity. Water quality protection remains a key focus with agricultural erosion and sediment control projects, with a goal of keeping soil in place and managing water volumes on farms. The District hosts and participates in a number of events throughout the year such as soil health workshops, grazing clinics, community education, and other agricultural related outreach events. This bill had the aim to shift responsibility for managing packaging waste from consumers and municipalities to the companies distributing the product. The goal of the bill was to improve recycling but did not have efficient means of making this happen. Penalties to companies for noncompliance would have been around \$1,000 per day for each violation. Overall, this bill needed to be reworked, and Farm Bureau members knew it.

Through listening sessions with Farm Bureau members, the state legislature heard you and listened. This shows the importance of showing up and making your voice heard.

• Farmers have received their first credits for the Overtime Tax Credit and Refundable Investment Tax Credit.

Since NYS has passed overtime laws applicable to farmers, they have also allowed for an Overtime Tax Credit. This credit is available to farmers who have paid overtime up to 60 hours and is a great benefit to NYS farmers. This shows the importance our farmers play in the NYS economy and that New York does want farmers to stay and keep contributing to the economy. The Refundable Investment Tax Credit recently enacted in the state budget is available to farmers who derive more than two-thirds of their gross income from farming. This means that farmers can now claim a substantial tax credit on newly purchased farm equipment. Currently it is in place through 2027 and will be of great benefit to farmers.

All these wins in our state legislature, together with the resources that Farm Bureau makes available to its members, makes me committed to speaking up for farmers, and proud to represent Ontario County as your Farm Bureau President. I hope this strengthens your appreciation for being a Farm Bureau member and inspires you to invite your friends and neighbors to join. Farm Bureau doesn't just work for its members; it advocates for all farmers in New York State. The more members Farm Bureau has, the stronger our voice becomes and only makes us more relevant to the people we are talking with.

The chapter has been working hard to build the K - 12 Ag Program as well. Midlakes Elementary students participated in a coloring contest during FFA Week and learned all about pumpkins during Ag Literacy Week.
